Interregnum Arrangements

Dear Friends,

In the life of clergy change is a constant. Most of us have a number of parishes over the years and with each change we normally move house - sometimes moving diocese as well. For congregations too, life changes. When I arrived as Vicar in Wingham a member of the congregation said, "I have seen eight come and eight go", which was a reminder of the temporary nature of things.

At times of change there are many emotions, anxiety, excitement, gratitude, sadness amongst others, which is perfectly natural and reflects the close bonds that develop over the years. I have hugely enjoyed my time as Rector here, probably dominated by the covid years, and have many happy memories and made many good friends over the last seven years. Parting is a sad moment, and I will miss life in Canterbury and the many opportunities that have come my way to minister and to get along-side you. So, I want to say thank you to you all for your support and prayers in all that we have shared.

Times of transition are also important moments to put our trust in God. My favourite bible verse says, 'The one who calls is faithful and will do this.' What is important is everyone pulling together, looking to the needs of each other and putting your trust in God, who journeys with you.

So, thank you and every blessing as we travel on our separate journeys, enriched by the past and open to the future.

An inspiring return Visit

In 1963 or '64, I went on a sixth-form trip from London to visit the newly opened Coventry Cathedral.

I remember being stunned by its glory, each piece of art

work so thoughtfully positioned, beautiful in its own right and adding to the holiness. As a sixteen year-old who was wondering if the Christian story had something to say to her, I realized that this religion was not just a dusty medieval relic, but relevant and active in my modern 'Sixties' world.

In March this year, I finally returned and met my teenage self. I was moved all over again, and this time able to wander at my own pace around this holy place and then out into the 'empty' space of the ruined original Cathedral, flattened by a bombing raid in 1940.

I stayed to join a local primary school group in the Cathedral's daily Litany of Reconciliation which can be found on the Coventry Cathedral website* and is central to its mission to build peace in the world, and this is the homily that the Chaplain that morning offered to the children, and to me:

As a young man, newly -wed, he had hastily opened up a boxed wedding present, and in his rush he broke the lovely china dish packed in the box. If only, he'd thought, the box had been labelled 'Fragile, handle with care', he'd surely have taken more care - and just so, we should always treat everyone we meet as if they too wear an invisible label: 'Fragile, handle with care'. Spring is in the air and the ground is beginning to be workable. At one point I thought all my spring flowers were growing webbed feet. March was the month for the Big Plastic Count, and you will be getting your household results. It is very difficult to avoid so much of the plastic we try to recycle or have to bin when retailers insist on putting so many

items into plastic boxes or bags and covering them with unrecyclable plastic film.

Eco Survey: Thank you to everyone who filled in the survey. There have been several very positive suggestions as to how we, as a church, could make progress towards Zero Carbon and we will be sharing those with you as soon as we can.

Monthly Tip: A Rocha (Eco Church) Celebrate Spring. Immerse yourself in the sights and sounds of the season – breathe in the fragrance of blossoms, observe budding catkins, note different bird songs, spot footprints, or use the Pl@ntNet app to identify spring flowers. Nature can boost our happiness, so spend time in your garden, on your balcony, and in local green spaces. Dedicate quality time to appreciate creation's beauty and thank God for the hope that spring can bring. This seems a very appropriate tip for us all especially in this Easter season.

St Martin's Churchyard: Some of the snowdrops that were planted have flowered in the churchyard and we need to have a go at the brambles again. The two heaps we created between the trees on the far side are beginning to subside and should be full of insects. There are no signs of hedgehogs but patience and persistence in providing them with shelter will hopefully result in them visiting us. The squirrels are as busy as ever and Lottie continues to keep them in order as we walk to church on Sundays.

The Deanery Eco Group has contacted the council about No Mow May and discovered that the issue is the lack of equipment to mow long grass. We need to consider whether there are parts of the churchyard that could be set aside, the grass and other plants allowed to grow thus creating pockets that are wildlife friendly. It looks untidy but ultimately will be of benefit to everyone.

The Eco Fayre planned by the Deanery Eco Group is to be opened by the Lord Mayor. She is very interested in the work of voluntary groups in the city and very supportive. Do make every effort to attend on 11th May from 10:00 am - 1:00 pm at St Peter's Anglican Church, Canterbury.

Perils on the Ministry Road

250 copies of the Parish Pocket -sized diary were paid for by local advertisements procured by the printer at no cost to the church. Sale at 50p each would produce £125 for church funds.

On the day the diary's arrived and were delivered to the PCC Secretary, she came to see me anxiously clutching a copy. 'Is everything all right, I enquired?' 'Well, not exactly' she replied, 'I really don't know what to say.' I could see there was a problem.

It was the very simple advertisement from the village post office which contained a biblical reference 'Proverbs 23 verse 28'. The PCC Secretary had looked it up

and been horrified to read; 'The harlot lies in wait like a robber, and increases the faithless among men'. It looked as if the owner of the post office could be referring to his wife!

I grabbed my Revised Standard Version of the bible to see what might have happened. Sure enough when I opened the page where chapter 22 moves into chapter 23, I could see that what the man intended to convey was in Proverbs 22 verse 28 - 'Remove not the ancient landmark which your fathers have set'. The viability and future of the local post office were under threat. The owner was wanting to say, 'Use it or lose it.' I needed to have a word with him.

To say that he was embarrassed by what had happened is an understatement, for he now feared his marriage as well as his business was in peril. Action was needed.

On being approached, the publishers (at no cost to the parish) saved the day on every front by sending me 250 self-adhesive stickers showing the post office advert with the biblical text corrected.

The PCC Secretary, did what was necessary, and the diary went on sale. No reference to this incident appeared in the PCC minutes.

Cause of the Month - April

This is an international Christian charity supporting Christians facing persecution and discrimination in many countries, affecting over 365 million brothers and sisters

worldwide. This may surprise many of us. I count myself very fortunate to be a Christian in Britain, rather than in North Korea, Somalia, Eritrea and elsewhere.

A recent email reported the abduction of about 500 children in two separate attacks from schools in northern Nigeria, many of whom will have been from Christian families. Boko Haram terrorists were the perpetrators who have abducted many children before and held them for ransom. Details can be deeply distressing. Open Doors ask for prayers for the release of the children and that God's comfort will surround them and their loved ones.

This is just one example of a crying need that the parish contributes towards with prayerful support of the great work of Open Doors.



April Archive 1984

The Bishop of Dover would be leading a Quiet Afternoon in St. Paul's on Saturday 7th., the day before Passion Sunday. Bishop Third had also been at the helm of one of the Lent House Groups taking place in the parish.

Writing of Holy Week and Easter, the Rector made special mention of the Service of New Fire and First Eu-

charist, which in those days began at 11.15 on the evening of Holy Saturday.

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting was imminent, and this magazine contained the annual report, which was substantial. Of particular interest was the Sunday School report, in which Mary Fennell commented on the growing number of children, and the fact that the creche and the younger Sunday School children both had to meet in the Church Hall. (The older boys, 8-13, met in the vestry.) The idea of a combined opening act of worship was working well. A notable innovation (not previously covered in Pilgrim Post) was a monthly Family Eucharist, for which the Sunday School children joined with the congregation and often participated.

In the report on the fabric, goods, and ornaments of St. Martin's, it was mentioned that a silver chalice and paten had been stolen. Recovered by the police, they had been repaired and polished and were now back in use. It was noted elsewhere that the St. Martin's Guides (not a uniformed group, but a body of volunteers), of whom there were 26, continued to welcome visitors between May and September.

The diocesan leaflet included a response by the Archbishop to the question: How can we attract more young people into the Christian faith? Perhaps surprisingly, he was dubious about contemporary styles of worship. Making a distinction between churchgoing and faith, he put the emphasis on personal example. It was also reported that the choir of Hythe parish church, under Berkeley Hill, was the only British choir to gain a place at an international festival in Lovato, Italy. 40 years on, Prof. Hill still has a thriving choir, though the boys now sing only at Evensong, not in the mornings. A former student of his directs the music at Holy Trinity, Folkestone, with whose choir we have a personal link.

JESUS in JOHN'S GOSPEL

There are four distinct approaches to Jesus in the New Testament Gospels - they are each different and give us a quide on how Jesus impressed those who knew him, and what it was about him that changed their lives for ever.



In the other three gospels, the Jesus of history speaks in a particular way with a wealth of parables, and in short, pithy, vivid sentences. The gospel of John gives a different profile. There are no parables, but long mystical discourses whose style often closely resembles that of the evangelist himself rather than the actual words of Jesus.

Probably written around AD 90, the Jesus of history loses his human side and takes on a glow of divinity as the Christ of Faith. Nothing seemingly bothers him. No one argues with him. He is in complete charge at all times. He even decides when he will allow people to kill him. His death is not a defeat but 'the hour' of his triumph. Jesus, portrayed by John to the community of faith in Ephesus, is 'majestic' and reigns triumphantly in glory.

Conclusion of the Series. Four gospels - four distinct approaches to Jesus. Within our community of faith wherever we are, we are free to choose how we see Jesus. Each of us needs a different Jesus at different times in our lives. The historical Jesus came to save us from the things we each need to be saved from and to give us abundant life. Created in the image of the God we worship 'in spirit and in truth'. Taking Jesus into ourselves, our lives are changed for ever. The spirit of truth leads us into all truth. The Jesus of history and the kingdom he proclaims is good news, and freedom, and the Christ of faith assures that we are each known and loved by God for this life and into eternity. **Editor**



St Mary & St Eanswythe Church in Folkestone to unite three generations of important Christian women. Together, the three churches are opening a new pilgrimage trail starting at St Martin's and passing through the Kent Downs National Landscape and Elham Valley to finish at the shrine of Saint Eanswythe – the only shrine in England that still houses the relics of its founding saint.

Here at St Martin's, the pilgrimage aims to bring light to the work of Queen Bertha in welcoming St Augustine and his men to Kent and providing much needed support in converting her husband as well as the kingdom of Kent to Christianity. Bertha's influence has long been overshadowed in history, relegated to the side of the main story and yet now, with the help of this project, we hope that her part in the story will become better recognised.

Meanwhile her daughter Ethelburga and granddaughter Eanswythe are being remembered for their influences in forming some of the first Christian communities in the country. This is an important step that has been made in bringing the long-forgotten women of the past back to the forefront of the narrative, and, we hope that through this project, people will feel themselves being able to connect more closely to these women and their faith.

The project aims to be officially launched at the end of April and more information can be found online.

St Martin's Church had not one, but two encounters into the world of television last month. The first was the filming for the Easter Sunday Songs of Praise Special, and those involved tell me that it was a rather cold and early start but well worth it to see our small church on the TV!

Our curate, Charlotte spoke to journalist Andy Dickenson about the importance and heritage of the church and the impact Queen Bertha had; whilst churchwarden Chris-

-tine Robinson spoke about the spiritual importance and how pilgrimages are encompassed into the feeling of St Martin's rich history. The aim of the piece was to celebrate Bertha and her influence during Women's History Month and to try and let people know that they have such an important historical church right on their doorstep.

I am happy to hear that many people enjoyed watching it and the very next day the church welcomed visitors who had seen it on the news. As the year goes on, I hope that we can keep bringing the story of Bertha and St Martin's to the wider community.

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
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
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
